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# National Day for Truth and Reconciliation - Orange shirt day!



September 30 is both the **National Day for Truth and Reconciliation** and **Orange Shirt Day**. Orange Shirt Day is an Indigenous-led grassroots commemorative day intended to raise awareness of the individual, family and community inter-generational impacts of residential schools, and to promote the concept of “Every Child Matters”. The orange shirt is a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations.

## Every Child Matters.

Thank you to Rev Alexander Campbell who provided the information below on Orange Shirt Day.

### *What is Orange Shirt Day?*

*Orange Shirt is a national movement in Canada for Indigenous and non-Indigenous people to come together in the spirit of hope and reconciliation to honour former residential school students whose families and communities have been impacted by the policies and actions of the Government of Canada and the churches that operated the schools.*

*Orange Shirt Day began in Williams Lake, BC in 2013 at the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) residential school commemoration event and has since spread across the country. The name Orange Shirt Day honours survivor Phyllis Webstad's story of having her shiny new orange shirt taken away from her from school officials on her first day of school at the Mission.*

*The date of the annual event was chosen because it is the time of year that children were removed from their families and forced to attend residential schools.*

*Orange Shirt Day inspires Canadians to initiate anti-racism and anti-bullying initiatives in schools and the workplace.*

*The residential school era began in the early 1870's, with the last school closing in 1996. More than 150,000 Indigenous, Métis and Inuit children attended these schools, with an estimated 80,000 survivors living today.*

*In summary, 'Orange Shirt Day' is a day to raise awareness of Indian Residential Schools, their history, the impacts they've had on Indigenous (First Nations, Metis, and Inuit) children and the intergenerational trauma that has impacted and continues to impact survivors and their families. Though there is still a lot of work to be done, it is a small step towards reconciliation.*

*I encourage you to wear an orange shirt, dress, or an orange anything on Friday, September 30 to show your ongoing support and awareness of these events that affect our people.*

# Diocesan retreats:

Over the last two months, several adult retreats were held at Camp Harding. What have the experiences been like?

“Arriving at Camp Harding is like arriving in a new land. After a long drive with highway noises and the regular sounds of civilization and still experiencing some of the stress of getting organized to come to Cypress Hills, to step out of the vehicle into this new settling is unbelievable.” The silence, the beauty of nature’s order and the presence of the Spirit of God blesses me. Cypress hills seems like a gift for the people who saw no trees and little water in the south grass lands. For myself and many others it’s a place to be restored, comforted or just quieted. This is one of the places that God has provided for me to find peace and often healing. That’s why I love Camp Harding.”

“I attended this retreat because I was uncertain of what direction I should go in life. I left the retreat still uncertain of what direction I should go, but with the distinct sense that all of the yardsticks I had been using to decide were completely worthless. This is an improvement, but it’s a hard improvement to sit with. The retreat did a very good job at what it intended to do - put me into closer contact with God - but it didn’t feel like how I wanted it to feel. I would recommend that others try a retreat nearly unconditionally, so long as they have strong pastoral support at home.

The Cypress Hills are wonderful, and Camp Harding is delightful. Nothing compares to lying on my back and staring up at the tops of the lodgepole pines swaying on a sunny day. I also strongly recommend that all retreatants bring a tent and a sleeping bag; waking up at sunrise really enhanced the experience for me.”

"I love attending retreats. It gives me a time and a space to be separate for the Lord. I always learn something new at retreats and end up having a deeper relationship with my Lord and saviour. This year I learned that I had been too busy doing and being in this world and not resting and being in our Lord's arms.

This year's lay retreat was very emotional, physical and spiritual experience for me. There was a struggle within which ended with an awakening and strengthening of my spirit. I praise God for this and thank Him for always being with me, having my back and carrying my load. I was reminded that I need to rest and abide in our Lord always.

I believe that everyone should go to at least one or two lay retreats. There is always something new to learn; whether it is something you hear from God, the facilitator, or from discussions with others. It also helps to build up your faith when you spend time with and study with other fellow believers."

### Preaching Series:

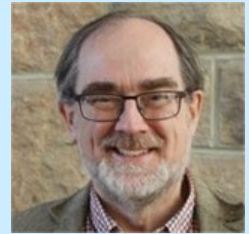

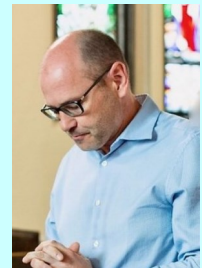
